This year we celebrated a major milestone in establishing a \$1 million endowment that will fund academic scholarships for deserving RISE students. Thanks to a generous gift from Gary and Sue Farha we now have the Farha Family Go Green Scholarship and the \$100,000 Farha Family Go Green Student Travel Fund. These two funds significantly change the ability of the RISE program to recruit and retain students pursuing degrees in environmental studies.

Sue Farha sends a critically important message to our students that we need and support future leaders for a sustainable future. I look forward to awarding our emerging leaders in RISE with financial support for their education in all disciplines that intersect with climate science and environmental sustainability.

Students were also exposed to new concepts and global initiatives in ecological restoration, conservation and environmental justice. This type of travel is typically out of reach for freshmen due to the expense of conference travel. Now thanks to the Farha's and the establishment of this endowment, first year students are able to have complete access the professional

development and scholarly growth that is gained by attending professional conferences.

By establishing this scholarship fund at MSU, we can provide opportunities for students to pursue their passion in this field and contribute to the exciting challenges that lie ahead.

1855 PLACE COMMUNITY GARDEN

This year, RISE forged a new partnership with the 1855 Place Community Garden.
Constructed in 2019 by students, the garden was designed for residents of the 1855 Place Apartments as a place to develop a sense of belonging and increase access to healthy foods. 1855 Place Apartments provide housing primarily to international graduate students and their families. This year the garden will host 50+ gardeners from 25 different countries.

The partnership started as a campus change project initiated during the RISE Retreat in the summer of 2023. Incoming RISE students

had a strong interest in addressing food insecurity on campus and felt that the 1855 Place Community Garden was an ideal space to explore solutions to food insecurity. The idea was further developed among RISE students in NSC 192 fall semester. Throughout the year, students helped prepare the site by laying fabric, building raised beds, seeding culturally inclusive transplants, and more.

This project complements the weekly food distribution that supplied produce from the Student Organic Farm (SOF) to Spartan Parent Resource Center (SPRC) families during September and October. With these

partners, RISE supported the distribution of over 3600 pounds of fresh food to the residents at the 1855 Place Apartments.

Additionally, this project spurred a new partnership with the Greater Lansing Food Bank Garden Project, with which the 1855 Place Community Garden is now registered.

As a result of this gift, 24 RISE first year

students were able to attend the 2024

In line with the 2030 MSU Strategic Plan, we feel that this project supports a sense of belonging among international graduate students and first-year undergraduate students seeking to build community here at MSU.
